I had the impression that libraries were quiet spaces where you dedicate yourself to

reading, but I changed my mind when I became the director of the library. Libraries nowadays are also spaces for group work, not just 'quiet spaces'. When I was a postgraduate student, I used the library a lot for literature searches, but now with the increase in e-journals, students no longer need to go to the library. Doing research at the library used to be an essential part of completing report assignments, but with the spread of the internet, research assignments have become less meaningful. There is no doubt that the function of libraries will continue to change and paper books may disappear. What kind of space the library will be in the future depends on the wishes of all of you. Many of you may have attended a book garden (book selection event) . Book Garden is an event where bookshops come to the library and select books you would like to have in our library

Issue 16, published in October 2012, reported on its predecessor, the book selection

From 2000 to 2014, users went to the relevant bookshop and selected the books they wanted to have in the library. 40 people participated and 822 books were placed in

Now, the bookshop comes to the library and offers a selection of books, and the number of participants has increased to around 800. It has become an annual event that is now widely cherished.

During the Great East Japan Earthquake, no books fell at Toyosu Library because all buildings were seismically isolated. In contrast, some books fell due to vibrations at Omiya Library, although seismic reinforcement work had been completed. Also, large architectural books dropped at Shibaura Library, which existed at the time. Fortunately, there was no damage to users or the building.

After the earthquake, we introduced anti-fall tapes to prevent books from falling, and we are trying to organize the shelves even more than before. This ensures that books do not fall.

Libraries are committed to disaster preparedness and are committed to the safety of people and the protection of materials. For this reason, we ask for the cooperation of all users. If an earthquake occurs, move away from the shelves and keep safe under the table.
